kinds of writing and speaking the exercises are arranged from simple to more complex what's more the exercises are cumulative meaning that later exercises incorporate the skills acquired preceding exercises this series is a step by step apprenticeship in the art of writing and rhetoric fable the first book in the writing rhetoric series teaches students the practice of close reading and comprehension summarizing a story aloud and in writing and amplification of a story through description and dialogue students learn how to identify different kinds of stories determine the beginning middle and end of stories recognize point of view and see analogous situations among other essential tools the writing rhetoric series recovers a proven method of teaching writing using fables to teach beginning writers the craft of writing well

the idea behind this text is to help educators charter school instructors and home educators integrate formal rhetoric writing into their middle and high school level courses this text is set up in a once a week format allowing educators to integrate it into their current curriculum easily and hopefully seamlessly rhetoric a text for middle and high school students is designed as an introductory writing text covering a broad range of grades with a specific focus on writing educators may want to include additional materials to focus more on different aspects of rhetoric and critical thinking for higher or more advanced students educators can also include the added activities and separate grammar vocabulary and language arts for a complete semester long english credit class

in the archives of composition offers new and revisionary narratives of composition and rhetoric's history it examines composition instruction and practice at secondary schools and normal colleges the two institutions that trained the majority of u.s. composition teachers and students during the nineteenth and twentieth centuries drawing from a broad array of archival and documentary sources the contributors provide accounts of writing instruction within contexts often overlooked by current historical scholarship topics range from the efforts of young women to attain rhetorical skills in an antebellum academy to the self-reflections of harvard university students on their writing skills in the 1890s to a close reading of a high school girl's diary in the 1960s that offers a new perspective on curriculum debates of this period taken together the chapters begin to recover how high school students composition teachers and english education programs responded to institutional and local influences political movements and pedagogical innovations over a one hundred and thirty year span

professional writing and rhetoric is a disciplinary reader that introduces students to professional writing by inviting them into conversations about the field by people in the

field intended for undergraduates and entry level masters students who are majoring minoring or getting certificates in professional writing studies professional writing and rhetoric is an edited reader that makes the field's theoretical discussions accessible to these students addressing a growing need as the field expands up from service oriented courses and down from advanced graduate programs it fills an important gap in the books currently available within professional writing studies this text guides students into the discussions that continue to form this relatively young field by 1 organizing readings rhetorically 2 including several readings that are regularly cited in the field's literatures 3 selecting readings that are accessible to students and 4 offering pedagogical devices that aid comprehension and encourage critical reflection the aim is not to present a greatest hits of the field nor to direct students thinking and practice toward the hottest new theories nor to challenge the thinking of those already comfortably in the field instead older and newer selections are intermixed within a rhetorical framework to encourage students to make connections across readings promote reflective rhetorical practice stimulate discussion and encourage students to become co inquirers within the discipline

anyone who laments the demise of print text would find a sympathetic listener in andrea a lunsford anyone who bemoans the lack of respect for blogs graphic novels and other new media would find her no less understanding lunsford is at home in both camps because she sees beyond writing's ever changing forms to the constancy of its power to make space for human agency or to radically limit such agency lunsford is a celebrated scholar of rhetoric and composition and many undergraduates taking courses in those subjects have used her textbooks here she helps us see that writing is not just a mode of communication persuasion and expression but a web of meanings and practices that shape our lives lunsford tells how she gained a new respect for our digital culture's three v's vocal visual verbal while helping design and teach a course in multimedia writing on the importance of having a linguistically pluralistic society lunsford draws links between such varied topics as the english only movement language extinction ebonics and the text messaging shorthand 133t lunsford has seen how words writing and language enforce unfair power relationships in the academy most classroom settings she writes are authority based and stress individualism ranking hierarchy and therefore we have belatedly come to understand exclusion

concerned about the paucity still of tenured women and minority faculty she urges schools to revisit admission and retention practices these are tough and divisive problems lunsford acknowledges yet if we can see that writing has the power to help prolong or solve them that writing matters then we have a common ground

this handbook brings together scholars from around the globe who here contribute to our understanding of how digital rhetoric is changing the landscape of writing increasingly all of us must navigate networks of information compose not just with computers but an array of mobile devices increase our technological literacy and understand the changing dynamics of authoring writing reading and publishing in a world of rich and complex texts given such changes and given the diverse ways in which younger generations of college students are writing communicating and designing texts in multimediated electronic environments we need to consider how the very act of writing itself is undergoing potentially fundamental changes these changes are being addressed increasingly by the emerging field of digital rhetoric a field that attempts to understand the rhetorical possibilities and affordances of writing broadly defined in a wide array of digital environments of interest to both researchers and students this volume provides insights about the fields of rhetoric writing composition digital media literature and multimodal studies

defining a rhetoric as a social invention arising out of a particular time place and set of circumstances berlin notes that no rhetoric not plato's or aristotle's or quintilian's or perelman's is permanent at any given time several rhetorics vie for supremacy with each attracting adherents representing various views of reality expressed through a rhetoric traditionally rhetoric has been seen as based on four interacting elements reality writer or speaker audience and language as emphasis shifts from one element to another or as the interaction between elements changes or as the definitions of the elements change rhetoric changes this alters prevailing views on such important questions as what is appearance what is reality in this interpretive study berlin classifies the three 19th century rhetorics as classical psychological epistemological and romantic a uniquely american development growing out of the transcendental movement in each case studying the rhetoric provides insight into society and the beliefs of the people
